# Why is water blue?

Water is faint blue. Although water appears clear in small quantities (like a glass of water), the blue colour becomes visible the more water we look through. Thus, deep lakes and seas are bluer than a shallow river.

Other factors can affect the colour we see:

- Particles and solutes can absorb light, as in tea or coffee. Green algae in rivers and streams often lend a blue-green colour. The Red Sea has occasional blooms of red Trichodesmium erythraeum algae.
- Particles in water can scatter light. The Colorado river is often muddy red because
  of suspended reddish silt in the water. Some mountain lakes and streams with
  finely ground rock, such as glacial flour, are turquoise. Light-scattering by
  suspended matter is required in order that the blue light produced by water's
  absorption can return to the surface and be observed. Such scattering can also shift
  the spectrum of the emerging photons toward the green, a colour often seen when
  water laden with suspended particles is observed.
- The surface of seas and lakes often reflect blue skylight, making them appear bluer.
   The relative contribution of reflected skylight and the light scattered back from the depths is strongly dependent on the observation angle.

# Vale - Ken Newham

## **Life Member**, Cruising Yacht Club of Tasmania **Commodore** – 1983/84; 1984/85; 1985/86 Cruise of the Year 1993

It is with great sadness that the Club notes the passing of one of its stalwarts, Ken Newham. Ken passed away on 15 September 2008.

Ken and Doris joined the Cruising Yacht Club of Tasmania in 1977, while the Club was in its infancy. With his appetite for hard work, and his head brimming with ideas, Ken was an invaluable member of a growing club. Many of the traditions we now enjoy were instigated, or contributed to, by Ken Newham.

Following a cruise to the Whitsundays during 1977, Ken decided to present the *Club* with a cup manufactured from an aluminium mast section as a trophy for the 'Cruise of the Year'. It is the same trophy that is still awarded to our most adventurous cruisers.



Ken was a significant contributor the to of the restoration Mariners Cottages. where his practical skills ablv demonstrated. Ken, who had overseen the transition while Commodore, then took on the newly-created position of Warden, to ensure the gains were consolidated.

The high hopes of those mid-80s committees are embodied in Ken's enthusiasm and generosity.

In September 1991 the

Club elected Ken Newham as its first Honorary Life Member, along with his wife, Doris. Their cruises in Alkira took them to Lakes Entrance and the Whitsunday Islands (three times) plus numerous cruises in Tasmanian waters. They were regulars at Port Davey, and were well known amongst the cruising fraternity.

Those members who joined the Club in the late 1980s were fortunate to have the experience of two generous members, Ken Newham and Derek Farrar, to assist them in their cruising endeavours. Between them, accredited AYF navigation courses were conducted on a regular basis, which were well supported by Club members. Ken gently guided his students through

the course requirements, and the whole process became a sharing of his knowledge, rather than a theoretical test

On the water, practical advice was always available. Ken's electrical communication knowledge was second to none, and his engineering expertise allowed him to fix problems that would keep many of us off the water. After the sinking of the English yacht, Talis II, (at Maatsuyker Island) Ken offered to assist in his usual understated way. The owners gave him small jobs at first, but soon found they could depend on the workmanship and professional engineering executed by Ken. He shared his knowledge freely, and any prospective boat-buyer was well advised to have a chat with Ken.

Ken's contribution to the Club will live on. He has left a great deal to the Cruising Yacht Club of Tasmania. He was honoured with Life Membership in 1991, and is remembered fondly by all who were fortunate to know him. The Club offers its condolences to his wife, Doris, to Steve, and the rest of the family.
