Having the courage to make the right decision for you no matter what others do is perhaps one of the most important lessons in cruising and has to be one of the principles that we must foster to be able to provide safe enjoyable cruising for our members.

## **Receiving Weather Faxes with an iPad**


One of the outcomes of the September HF Radio Winter Forum, held on board Whitehaven, was interest in an App to receive weather faxes. The best way to receive a weather fax is to use a hard-wired connection from the radio to the laptop or tablet, rather than using audio via a microphone.

If you use an IBM-style laptop, you can make up a cable from your HF receiver output with a 3.5 mm plug on the other end. Put the 3.5 mm plug into the MIC socket on your laptop and you're away.

However, iPads being Apple, such a simple cable will not work, and an adaptor is required. The schematic below is taken from Black Cat System's website,

http://www.blackcatsystems.com/ipad/iPad\_iPhone\_iPod\_Touch\_Microp hone\_Wiring.html

but with Jaycar part numbers. P1 is a tip/ring/ring/sleeve 3.5 mm plug and will fit into the iPad headset socket. It's not strictly the same plug as Apple uses but as we are only using the two terminals closest to the plug body, i.e. Ring2 and Shield, and as there is no polarity issue, just connect a wire to each terminal, twist them together and solder them to R1 and T1. You don't need shielded cable as long as the wires are relatively short. I mounted the resistor, transformer and potentiometer on a small piece of Veroboard (Google it!) then put everything except P1 into an old 35 mm film cannister. I've found that the potentiometer works well at its maximum setting, so you could start without it initially (wire directly from the transformer secondary to the input socket J2). I used an open mono 3.5 mm socket (Jaycar PS-0120) for J2 as I had a 3.5 mm plug on an existing cable.



The connection to the HF receiver should, ideally, be independent of the receiver volume control. For some lcom models, the audio output details are:

IC-M802	ACC socket, pins 2 (gnd) and 5.
IC-M801	AF/MOD socket, pins 3 (gnd) and 4.
IC-M710	ACC(1) socket, pins 2 (gnd) and 5.
IC-M700	External speaker jack.
IC-718	ACC socket, pins 2 (gnd) and 12.

For an iPad, try the *HF FAX* app (by Black Cat Systems). For IBM-laptops, I use SeaTTY. If you have the AirMail or SailMail program, use the built-in *GetFax* function.

# Women on Boats. Provisioning for longer voyages, stowing and waste management

The September WOB meeting was very well attended with several new faces and new members attending. We love our Stalwarts too.

De Deegan presented an interesting and thoughtful insight into Provisioning for longer Voyages. Storage and sensible stowage ideas, strategies for waste management and fantastic recipes were all covered, with a sample taste test to boot!...... Everyone loved the sample of "Pagnotta".

De has a great sense of what's most important in terms of providing for the crew aboard a longer passage, her experience underpinned a thorough coverage of how best to store fresh foods and ensure their longevity, meal planning, not giving up on great coffee, planning for seasickness in terms of food options, as well as long life products that will ensure a happy variety for all your crew. Keep a separate section of provisions for Night watch, with easy access to avoid disturbing crew who may be resting.

De shared a great strategy to leave your crew hankering for more with a special treat left up your sleeve for the last meal. Saving the best for last, an excellent idea

Waste management begins before you leave with removing excess packaging and being aware of free loading, hitch hikers like cockroaches, especially in the Tropics. Avoid cardboard, always remove prior to getting aboard, on the dock or in the tender if necessary.

Various ideas and Strategies were shared, with good discussion amongst the group. A thoroughly informative and enjoyable evening. Solo Pasta was a popular Dinner option afterwards with a record number of WOB attending the social part of the evening. I think De whet our appetites!

Next month we look at one of the most important aspects of passage planning. How to read the weather, both using BOM and weather Apps available, as well as looking at weather systems, clouds and reading Barometers to aid with predictions, especially when out of coverage or radio contact.

We encourage any new women members to consider coming along. It's always informative and good fun.

## Recipes

#### Recipes

My favourite Bread from the Women's Weekly Italian cookbook

Pagnotta

You will need:

15g(1/2oz) compressed yeast or 1 sachet of dry yeast ½ cup lukewarm water ½ teas sugar 3 cups plain flour 1 teas salt 1 tablespoon oil 1 cup lukewarm water extra Extra flour

Combine yeast sugar and ½ cup water and set aside for 15 min or slightly frothy. Place flour and salt in a non corrosive bowl and make a well in the centre, pour in the yeast mixture, oil and extra water. Mix well by hand until the dough leaves the side of the bowl; knead slightly. Lightly oil the bowl, replace the dough and cover in a warm place until doubled in bulk. Turn dough onto a lightly floured surface and knead well; use as little flour as possible. Shape in round, dust with flour and score the top. Put the dough in a cold oven, turn to moderately hot and bake for 45 min.

1 packet Tim Tams, crushed 1 small jar Nutella 200g cream whipped combine and freeze This does not need to be frozen solid and quantities can be amended.

## Winter Forum

On Monday 17<sup>th</sup> September a handful of members gathered aboard *Whitehaven* (Sean Connolly) for a mini winter forum on HF radio use led by Andrew Boon. While most yachts have a VHF radio relatively fewer have an HF radio. There are many reasons for this. Locally we have very good VHF coverage so there is little imperative to invest in an HF radio. An HF radio is more complex to install and more expensive to buy. New technology, such as Iridium GO! satellite-connected Wi-Fi hotspot, is to a large extent supplanting HF radio communication. This means that people are selling redundant HF radios cheaply. So, if you want one, now is a good time to get one. Why do we have one on *Tahiti*? Because previous owners equipped *Tahiti* with HF for their passage across the Pacific. If you are out on the open ocean HF is still a good way to communicate with other boats and shore stations. HF radio is a requirement for participants in the VDL Circumnavigation. And Andrew pointed out several useful things that HF can do. It is still a useful piece of equipment. If your boat has one, it is worth getting to know how to use it.

One important factor to appreciate about HF radios is that transmission power can be up to 150 W, and it can draw over 30 amps from your power supply. Good batteries, cables and fuses are required. The aerial is another vital piece of kit. This can be a whip aerial around 5 metres in length or a backstay with insulators fitted. A wire hauled up on a halyard will also do the job but is less convenient than a permanent set-up. If a backstay aerial is used it may be a good idea to have a whip aerial stowed somewhere for that awkward moment when the rig comes down mid-Atlantic or crossing the Southern Ocean. Andrew has one but has never needed to use it.

Using an HF radio seems to be something of an art. It involves tweaking, choosing the right frequency for the conditions, more tweaking, turning off any device that may produce interference, a bit more tweaking, and then something happens. So, what happens? There are more than a hundred frequencies to tweak between. Some of these, as for VHF, are channels for calling, distress, working, industry-specific working etc. There are numerous weather voice channels from Australia and NZ. A tip for these is to use a voice recorder in case the tinman voice has a soporific effect. Then there are weather FAX channels. These can be used to download current prognostic charts and forecasts. It was novel for me to see how this worked. An audio input can be fed into a computer or tablet or even a mobile phone and, with the appropriate software or app, the weather chart appears. This could be a convenient feature in more remote locations. It is also possible to tune in to local AM radio stations, such as 936 local ABC. Presumably the reception is better than on a standard radio. We will definitely be getting more familiar with our HF radio, getting a FAX reading app for the iPad, and doing some transmission practice. I think calling up Jeremy Firth at Dover Radio could be the go.



Call marine pollution in as a sécurité to TASMARITIME, who will call it out and fish farms will collect. Record it in your log, take photos, and let MAST know on <u>1300 135 513</u>. For large material report it to the EPA, especially if it's huge pipe lengths or other large infrastructure.

Please North Simmonds Mooring to 13m from 12.2m. This has been approved by MAST and was reported to the Committee 2months ago.

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#### **CYCT MOORINGS**

**Nubeena:** Mooring number 9615 at Nubeena is a bright yellow buoy situated close to the jetty opposite the main town wharf. It is in a great position to row to the main wharf, boat ramp or beach. The depth at high tide was 5.7m, with about 21m of mooring tackle to the three heavy train wheels. The position is 43°06.265'S 147°44.346'E. The buoy is yellow with hooks for the pickup float. The mooring is a short row from the public jetty in the SE corner of Parsons Bay.

**Barnes Bay:** Mooring number **8584** at North Simmonds Bay is a Yellow buoy. The depth at MLWS is about 5 metres. It is located at 43° 07.446' S, 147° 21.396' E. The mooring consists of 3 wheels, then 6m of 2-inch chain, then 6m of 1-1/2 inch chain then 6m of 5/8 inch chain. Simmonds Bay mooring is for up to 12.2 m vessels.


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
