This month, Rick Allen has contributed an interesting report on the Bull Bay cruise. What I puzzled over was why he signed off the article Bravo Zulu CYCT. A bit of Googling enlightened me and I have added a summary below but it is worth reading up about the origins and associated history of this signal. Thanks Rick!

#### Bravo Zulu

The combination of the Bravo and Zulu nautical signal flags, Bravo Zulu, also referred to as BZ, is a naval signal, typically conveyed by flaghoist or voice radio, meaning 'Well done' with regard to actions, operations or performance. In addition to the British Royal Navy it has also been used as part of vernacular slang within the US Navy, NATO and other Allied naval forces. It can be combined with the negative signal, spoken or written as NEGAT, to say NEGAT Bravo Zulu to convey 'Not well done' for a given action. (Wikipedia)

# Introducing new members

#### Graham Harris Moonwatch

My wife, Christine, and I arrived in Tasmania in 1984 to work for CSIRO when the Marine Labs were first opened. Having done a little bit of sailing in the Great Lakes in Canada we fulfilled a longstanding ambition and bought our own yacht, a Columbia 27, and, with the family (two boys), were active CYCT members in the late 1980s – the Ken Newham and Derek Farrar era. Algonquin was berthed in Kettering and I can well remember Sunday lunch barbecues at Apollo Bay!

Having sailed on research ships in the Laurentian Great lakes (Canada/USA) in the 1970s I did a lot of sea time on CSIRO research ships from 1984-88 not only around Tasmania: I did oceanographic research cruises from Townsville to Hobart and from Fremantle to Port Hedland. I got promoted so we sold up and moved to CSIRO HQ in Canberra in late 1988. We were there for fifteen years and my two boys are still there. Over the years, whilst living in Canberra, we kept Aquarella (that was Hans Van der Doe's Adams 36 also of CYCT repute) and Scylla (a 40 ft motor cruiser) in Hobart and came down regularly to sail. Both yachts were also berthed in Kettering before the present marina existed! I also raced an Eliot 5.9 trailer-sailer on the lake in Canberra – quite a strange experience compared to Tasmanian waters!

When I first retired from CSIRO in about 2003 we came back to live in Hobart for a while and bought Maggie May (an Adams/Radford Magellan 42) berthed her in the RYCT and raced her successfully in the Wednesday arvo races. Then I got a job offer in Northern England so Chris and I went to the UK and I worked there for three years from 2008-II. After I retired for a second time (!) we came back to Hobart and continued to sail Maggie May until Chris became very ill. We left Hobart to be closer to family in Canberra in 2013-14 and she died in NSW in 2017. In 2018 I came back to Hobart alone and, at first, sailed Defiance(a Swan 38) in the river in the Wednesday arvo races out of the RYCT (with crew) but, in the midst of the Covid lockdown in 2020, I swapped Defiance for Mal Wyatt's Kaufman 48 Moonwatch. The plan was to do the 2021 VDLC (but Covid put paid to that) so we did the rescheduled 2022 event this year. After a longish wait Moonwatch is now in Kettering. She's back and I'm back!

I've done a lot of offshore cruising. Over the years, from initially sailing with Hans van der Doe we did the Tall Ships race to Sydney and back in Bicentennial year (1988), a number of trips and deliveries to and from Sydney and the Gippsland lakes between the 90s and the "noughties" and the VDLC in 2007. In 2019 I help to deliver a Dufour 460 GL across the Mediterranean from Catania (Sicily) to Savona in Northern Italy (c. 570nm). I skippered *Moonwatch*(with 3-4 crew) on the VDLC this Feb/March (830nm) and just recently (this July) I skippered the Dufour 460 (two handed) back from Savona to Naples (420nm), island hopping down the west coast of Italy: Savona, Elba, Giglio, Ponza, Ventotene, Ischia, Procida, Capri, Naples. Huge fun! So, I am back to cruising short handed (not always with crew) in Tasmanian waters out of Kettering and would dearly love to reacquaint myself with the CYCT and its members. A lot of water has gone under a lot of keels since I was last a member!

#### Richard Scarr Lung Segs

I have been sailing since the age of seven in dinghies. The family has a Walker 28ft Herishoffe that I have been using for many years and she is moored in Sydney.

I have been involved in sailing in many capacities from owning a sailing school up to doing two Paralympic Games as a national coach for Australia coaching Matt Bugg in London where he placed seventh to then doing the Rio Olympics where Matt won silver. I have been cruising in Hobart for the last fifteen years on a mixture of boats.

I currently own a few cafes in Hobart

This current boat I bought in Cairns and have just sailed her back to Hobart over four weeks. Luna Seas is a Roberts 45 Ketch fibreglass built in Melbourne by shipwrights in 1985. She had a make over in Cairns with all new inside and out.

# Women on Boats report - Bev Hitchens



We welcomed a small but select gathering for Andrew Boon's presentation on Navigation Charts. Andrew presented a detailed look at the information contained on a navigation chart, in particular, how to interpret 'Zones of Confidence'. This topic engendered some discussion as local charts appear to have some anomalies in that respect. Andrew discussed the transition from paper to electronic charts, noting that there is a general trend towards more use of the latter, largely due to both practical and financial considerations. He has an interest in promoting the use of official charts, using the free software, OpenCPN (Chart Plotter Navigator), and explained the

benefits of accessing this system. Andrew's notes and further information on OpenCPN are available on the Club website Document Library. In addition, the Australian Hydrographic Office website has a wealth of information for mariners, including chart updates. To register for these notices, research the Australian Hydrographic Office – eNotices Registration. Many thanks to Andrew, for generously giving us his time and sharing his expertise.

A dedicated few retired to the Prince of Wales Hotel after the meeting, where the discussion continued over a tasty meal and possibly a glass of something fermented.

Our next meeting will be held on Monday 22<sup>nd</sup> November, featuring a presentation by Erika Shankley on the subject of weather, a consideration always uppermost in a mariner's mind!

# Bull Bay cruise report - Rick Allen

# Friday 23<sup>rd</sup> September

I 500, we slipped all lines at POW Bay Marina and after our report in to Tas Maritime Radio the crew and I set course for Bull Bay. Weather was not too bad although drizzling with rain and towards the entrance to Storm Bay an easterly swell gave Agent J (Jasper, my 3yo Moodle) something to worry about.

1740 Bull Bay. Finding *Crown Venture* and *Easting Down* already at anchor tucked up at the south end of the bay we dropped anchor and proceeded on with SCRAN (Beef Chow Mien) the 14 second .6 of a metre swell did nothing for our comfort and at one time during the movie the crew decided to pull the blinds up to stop the insistent banging of blind against window.

Agent J did not sleep all that well, due to all the knocks and bangs, keeping him (and ultimately me) in a constant state of alertness and therefore not much sleep!

# Saturday 24<sup>th</sup> September Bull Bay

0800 Deciding we should find somewhere less rolly I was beaten to the punch by Richard aboard *Easting Down* who phoned me suggesting Quarantine Bay and after a quick phone call to Mark and the others yet to arrive, we departed.

Not being familiar with the generic names for the bays I let Richard lead the way. Ultimately choosing Lodge Bay opposite Quarantine Bay because of a southerly breeze we anchored in the lee shore well before lunch and were quickly joined by *Gradiva* and *SY Cuvee*.

After visits from Richard and Shona then Rachel and Scott the crew settled into some fishing for the afternoon. I must say they were not biting all that well but it's something we have become accustomed to, but after one tiddler, (thrown back in disgust) Chris did his usual and jagged a 43cm flathead. Now I'm not sure where this individual came from but he was clearly lost and stumbled upon Chris's hook? I used the afternoon to install new PVC Blinds for the Bridge and aft doors, something to replace the aging venetian blinds that had been destroyed over a 35-year period.

1700 Sundowners saw crews off Crown Venture, Easting Down, Gradiva, SY Cuvee and Ariadnes Clew enjoy our hospitality aboard MV Southern Explorer where many a tale was told and friendships either rekindled or formed. It was decided to hold this inside due to the inclement weather. With the interesting stories of sailing the globe and, well what can I say - Tasmania really is a small place, with many of us inadvertently crossing paths at some time in the past, going to the same school etc.

After 3 hours of a scrumptious selection of food and drinks there was a constant return of RHIB's to our swim platform in a stream a bit like valet parking at a posh hotel.

# Sunday 25th September

After a much better sleep and some more fishing (one more flathead this time courtesy of Craig, my Chief Engineer) the weather was nigh on perfect, so good in fact I had Chris take some shots of us from our RHIB, something that doesn't happen every day. With the 0905 CYCT news discussing the various walks available at Quarantine Bay for those who wanted to take part, and even a run ashore for Gradiva's dogs where we were at Lodge Bay, we had a well deserved lunch then bid farewell and departed for the three and a half hour trip back to our berth.

To identify an individual volume or issue, it is important to insert the identifying number with the year and month, concatenated – ie June 2016 as 201606.

If you forget the URL, there's an aide-memoire on the Club's website. Just sign in and go to Member Menu/Documents/Albatross/Albatross Index/Past Issues Index, then download the document and the URL will be revealed!

There is an amazing amount of interesting information and numerous articles relating to cruising and associated subjects. Check out the 54 articles on Port Davey and the 180 contributions from former member, the late Denis Alexander, and a number of entries about offshore islands such as Tasman, Maatsuyker, Maria or Deal Island.

You never know what you might find!



## Tide Tables - Andrew Boon

I have always carried the Tasmanian Tides booklet aboard, but unfortunately it is no longer produced. The booklet reproduced the tide predictions from the Bureau of Meteorology, National Tidal Unit, for the standard ports in Tasmania, along with time differences for many other locations.

In its place these days, alternatives abound: Navionics, Windy, OpenCPN and every brand of chart-plotter has nice-looking plots of the rise and fall of the tide. I have had mixed experience with some of these and since comparing several for the Port Davey area a few years ago (when I found some predictions I80 degrees out of phase with the official tables and with reality), have preferred to rely on the 'official' tables, ie those produced by the National Tidal Unit and published in the Australian National Tide Tables 2022. (ANTT). Individual tables for standard ports can be downloaded from the Bureau of Meteorology web site:

Tide Predictions for Australia, South Pacific and Antarctica http://www.bom.gov.au/australia/tides/ Tide tables give the times and tide heights for each turn of the tide, High and Low Water. They are just numbers on a page and don't look nearly as sexy as the continuous curves of height vs time in your chart-plotter. But they are 'official'. Commercial vessels are required to carry the ANTT and the predictions contained are the same as in the tables you can download. I suspect an insurer might query your use of unofficial predictions in the unlikely event that your keel found a rock that should have been deeper!

But don't despair. You can now have official predictions AND nice curves! The *AusTides* programme, previously available for purchase on a CD, is now a free download from the Australian Hydrographic Office website.

The AusTide predictions of High and Low Water are identical with the ANTT. The examples below show the predicted tides for Bramble Cove for one week in table and curve form. You can see that the curves do tell more of the story than the simple tables, in this period of transition from diurnal to semi-diurnal tides (that's one tide a day to two tides a day).

The Help file for AusTides is the AusTides Manual, which is worth reading as it explains the causes of tides as well as using the programme. Being an official publication, AusTides is maintained and, if you are online when you open AusTides, updates can be downloaded.

Readers may be aware that I have been a promoter of the *OpenCPN* charting programme, particularly as it permits the use of official *AusENC* charts, including fortnightly updates. *OpenCPN* has a tidal prediction module which relies on calculated 'harmonic constants' to work out the tide height at any particular time. These constants are required for each location for which tides are displayed. The parameters used by *OpenCPN* seem to be from an old dataset with many secondary ports missing. The *AusTides* programme displays the constants used in its calculations, so I tried updating the *OpenCPN* constants and added the missing ports. The results are OK; the predictions are not exactly what *AusTides* shows but they are closer than a few other sources I have compared. If you use *OpenCPN* and are interested in updating your tide predictions, I have put a folder on the Club website under Member Menu/Documents/Cruising/Tides & Currents which explains how I went about it. The data available through *AusTides* is copyright so I haven't published the updated file, rather the document explains how you can use the *AusTides* data to update your own file, for personal use, of course.



## **Guidelines for the role of Cruise Contact**

#### General

To be successful, the CYCT cruising programme needs the support of volunteers to take on the role of cruise contacts for each cruise. By volunteering early for a cruise or two, you will lighten the load on the Vice Commodore and you will be able to set the tone, create variety and prepare an enjoyable cruise for the participants.

If you nominate to take on a cruise contact role before the cruising calendar is first planned, the Vice Commodore can liaise with you to promote your cruise through the web site, emails and the *Albatross*. Please contact the Vice Commodore at any time to volunteer for any remaining cruises on the cruising calendar needing a cruise contact.

The cruise contact role is extremely rewarding; it keeps you in close contact with all participants and leads to a better cruise experience for all, while supporting the club.

#### **Skipper's Responsibility**

Each vessel's skipper must exercise appropriate seamanship and discretion as to whether they should participate in, or continue with, any cruise. At all times, the responsibility for taking part in or continuing to take part in any CYCT cruise resides solely with the individual vessel's skipper.

#### **Cruise Contact's Responsibility**

One to two weeks before the cruise, email the registrants with more detailed planning of likely route and anchorages, activities, events, bookings, meal ideas, sundowners etc. The club website allows emails to be easily directed to all those registered for the cruise and the VC can assist with this.

#### Before the cruise

In the final week and at least 24 hours before the cruise, as the forecast weather for the cruise becomes clearer, issue the final plan by email, confirming:

- .... The final list of registered participants vessel names, crew names, one mobile phone number, .... your mobile phone number.
- $\dots$  radio sched times one per day is the minimum recommended 0905 hours is a good time CH 16 moving to CH 77,
- .... expected weather and its likely impact,
- .... discuss any appropriate points relating to navigation (focus on those who may not have been there before),
- .... the target anchorages,
- .... proposed timing,
- .... planned activities (sundowners, dinner, shared meal, quiz, breakfast etc or nothing if you prefer it's your choice),

Remind skippers of their individual responsibility.

Email is the recommended form of group communication before the cruise. VHF and text are the recommended form of communication once on the water.

#### On the cruise

- ....Conduct the regular radio sched with a general call to the CYCT fleet on CH16 and then going to CH77. Consider making a call to Tas Maritime each afternoon confirming names of boats that are together at that time. This saves many individual calls to Tas Maritime.
- ....Recap and provide any updates to the plan as a general broadcast to the fleet.
- ....Individually call each vessel in the order of the final list of registered participants, ask their position and answer any queries. (This is a good practice and confirms all vessels' radios are working and that they have received the general broadcast.)
- ....Welcome any new members and make them feel part of the group. (Use your dinghy and go and say g'day at the first anchorage).
- ....Introduce any new members to the group at sundowners.
- ....Provide updates on the weather and the current cruising plans and social plans during sundowners.
- ....Co-ordinate any planned activities.

All skippers are expected to let the Cruise Contact know if they choose to change their itinerary or no longer wish to participate in the cruise.

#### After the Cruise

In the week after the cruise please write a report for inclusion in the *Albatross* including two or three photos. Send the report to the editor. Also forward the final list of participating vessels and crew to the VC.

# Electronic Visual Distress Signals (EVDS)

#### You may have missed this information in the October MAST newslatter..

Legislation is under development to include EVDS as an alternative to handheld pyrotechnic flares. It is hoped this legislation can be introduced in the second half of 2023. The proposal is:

- In sheltered waters the four handheld flares would not be required, provided the boat owner is carrying an approved EVDS, a GPS-enhanced EPIRB, and a VHF radio.
- In open waters, the four handheld flares can also be substituted with an EVDS, but the two rocket/parachute flares will still be required, as well as the EPIRB and VHF radio.
- The EVDS must be product approved by MAST, with certain features such as being able to float, having an automatic SOS built in, a waterproof switch and a 6-hour battery life at a minimum.

Approved products will be listed on the MAST website once the legislation is introduced. An EVDS is not as simple as a Dolphin torch!

#### CYCT Burgee When and Where to Fly It

A burgee is traditionally used to identify members of a recreational boating organisation. It is generally flown from one of two locations while underway and at anchor. Most commonly it is flown from a halyard under the lowermost starboard spreader. However, more traditionally it is flown from a pig stick from the aft-most mast. Power boats which do not have a mast fly the burgee on a short staff at the bow.

It is a nautical tradition to exchange burgees when visiting other yacht clubs. Members heading off cruising can purchase burgees to take with them to exchange with other cruisers they meet or clubs they visit. When exchanging burgees with other clubs, please record the exchange with a picture which we can include in our newsletter or on our website.

We have two burgees – our Club Burgee which is white on a blue background which is flown either whilst underway or at anchor and our reversed blue on white background which is flown as an invitation to other cruisers to join your boat for sundowners.





#### **CYCT Moorings**

The CYCT owns two moorings, available for the exclusive use of CYCT and CCCA members (see CCCA MOU).

The use of a Club mooring is always at your own judgment and risk.

The CYCT accepts no liability for damage caused to vessels using the mooring or any damage caused by any failure of the mooring. You must have adequate insurance for your boat and third party liability.

## The following are the rules for the use of CYCT club moorings:

- The Club burgee (CYCT or CCCA) must be displayed on your vessel whilst on a club mooring.
- There must be a current insurance policy in force for the vessel, including third party liability.
- Maximum stay on the mooring is 24 hours; in unusual circumstances, the Vice Commodore may approve an extended stay.
- If a boat without a CYCT or CCCA burgee has picked the mooring up, kindly ask them if they are a member. If they aren't, advise them that the mooring is private and request them to leave.
- Notwithstanding that the moorings are lifted and serviced annually, at all times the use of the moorings remains at member's own risk.
- Members are asked to email the Vice Commodore and register their use of the mooring as soon as practicable.

#### North Simmonds Bav. Brunv Island Number 1 - 8584.

Mooring number 8584 at North Simmonds Bay is a yellow buoy with a pillar for the pickup rope. The depth at LMWS is about 5 metres. It is located at 43° 07.446' S, 147° 21.396' E. The mooring consists of 3 wheels, then 6 m of 2 inch chain, then 6 m of 1-1/2 inch chain then 6 m of 5/8 inch chain.

Maximum length permitted by MAST is 12.2 m.

This mooring was last serviced on 3 May 2022

# North Simmonds Bay, Bruny Island Number 2 - 7786.

Mooring number 7786 at North Simmonds Bay is a bright red/pink (Dec. 2020) buoy tail and smaller pale pink float. The depth at LMWS is about 7.5 metres. It is located at 43° 07.481' S, 147° 21.448' E.

Maximum length permitted by MAST is 17 m.

This mooring was last serviced on 3 May 2022.
