
Cruising responsibilities

Members and others taking part in CYCT events are reminded that the decision to participate in any cruise or event rests with each boat's skipper. Information supplied by the club, or its officers is intended as a guide only. The club does not control or lead events and neither the club nor the event coordinator is responsible for the safety of any boat crew or persons. Skippers are encouraged to keep Tas Maritime Radio informed of their location, destination, and plans during any cruise.

SAFETY - All participants in any cruise will have acknowledged the club safety recommendations when they indicated their intention to join the cruise. The club's safety recommendations should be reviewed by the cruise contact prior to departing on any cruise. These can be located on the CYCT website under the member menu.

Regardless of information supplied by the club or its officers the skipper is solely responsible for the boat at all times.

Commodore's report - Scott Poulter



It's sunny, 27 degrees, with light southwest winds in Cairns, today. Perfect to head out to the magnificent reefs off Cairns that we have visited many times. This time we flew up for a short visit with our daughter Lucy and son-in-law Alex. Both Lucy and I have birthdays in July, so it's a great time for a family get to together, with the added bonus of escaping some of Tassie's very cold winter this year. Lucy is expecting our first grandchild in December, and we are all very excited.

As I won't be re-nominating for commodore for 2024/25 I thought I might take this opportunity to talk about why I took on the role. I learnt to navigate attending the Australian Maritime College in 1985. I learnt to sail and started cruising

in 1988 aboard *Quasimodo*, a pocket maxi 65' racing yacht, converted for cruising. Mal & Val Innes (owners), Ken Newham (past life member of CYCT), Fish (best mate), and I cruised Quasimodo, first to Port Davey and then from Kettering to the Whitsundays. I was hooked. Rachel and I purchased a Compass 28, and we joined the CYCT in the late 80's.

Later, now living on the mainland, we purchased *Heemskirk*, a 47' steel ketch. We joined the Royal Queensland Yacht Squadron (RQYS), primarily to access their marina facilities, and soon became heavily involved in their cruising group. Rachel and I served on the committee for 8 years and spent two years as cruising group chair. The RQYS cruising group organised monthly weekend cruises around Moreton Bay, and extended cruises in company to destinations including the Clarence River, Mooloolaba, Lady Musgrave Lagoon and the Whitsundays.

In 2016 we retired and moved aboard *Heemskirk* and then *Gradiva* for five years. We cruised north to Lizard Island, south to Tassie, west to Port Lincoln and east to New Caledonia and Vanuatu. We had joined the "live aboard cruising community". This is a welcoming, helpful, resourceful, happy, loving community drawn together by the common interest of cruising. There is no organisation, other than a shared desire to enjoy cruising and enjoy cruising in company. This community is one of the best parts of living aboard.

In 2021we decided to move ashore to Port Sorrel. Port Sorrell is halfway between my dad in Burnie and Rachel's parents in Riverside. It seemed best to keep *Gradiva* in Hobart to access the great sheltered cruising areas in the southeast. We had re-joined the CYCT several years earlier and were keen to get involved, meet people, and share experiences.

While not a committee role, my favourite parts from the last three years has been leading the three extended cruises. The Furneaux Group cruise in 2022, the Macquarie harbour & Port Davey cruise in 2023 and the Bass Strait circumnavigation cruise in 2024. I feel that the CYCT should continue to offer these opportunities to cruisers in future years. Off the water, my favourite GM presentations have been when our members step up in front of the club and share

their cruising experiences and knowledge. Similarly, my favourite articles in the *Albatross* have been members' accounts of their latest cruising experiences.

The challenges of cruising are made far more rewarding by cruising in company. The RQYS cruising group, the "live aboard cruising community" and, the Cruising Yacht Club of Tasmania have been the enabling support for my cruising aspirations. These are the reasons I volunteered my time on committee for the past three years. Helping new members get onboard with CYCT as membership officer in my first year on committee was fantastic. The last two years as Commodore have been very rewarding, helping others enjoy cruising, expand their knowledge and grow their confidence in cruising.


Not dark Mofo in Constitution Dock - Andrew Boon

Adam Marmion paramedic from the rescue helicopter will present on rescue at sea at the August meeting.

Safety is everything

These are real reports from the US navy and annually cost the service lots of money, not to mention the loss of life and injury. There are lessons for us all here.

That Sinking Feeling.

A sailor on watch observed one of the unit's boats sitting lower in the water than several boats moored beside it. He notified the Command Duty Officer (CDO), who directed him to begin dewatering procedures and activate the bilge pumps. What followed was a series of missteps that doomed the boat to a near sinking.

The sailor turned on the pumps, but the seacock valves were left open, so the bilge pumps couldn't keep up.

- I) The sailor didn't know how to turn on the bilge pumps and had to contact another sailor for instructions.
- 3) The CDO arrived to find the sailor in waist-deep water on the boat, bailing water with an ammo can.
- 4) Other service members joined in the bailing while the sailor was then ordered to retrieve a P-100 pump—which he found, but it didn't have any hoses.
- 5) The sailor went to the fire station to see if they had a pump and they, in turn, contacted base police to respond.
- 6) Base police arrived (with no equipment or pumps because those aren't typical police gear).
- 7) Nearly two hours after the watchkeeper observed the flooding, the CDO obtained a P-100 pump from another command and began dewatering. The boat was eventually emptied, but the water caused more than \$350,000 in damage.

Multiple procedural compliance violations coupled with a lack of training and knowledge led to this costly mishap. Proper rounds weren't made, the unit hadn't trained in their emergency response procedures and the post-operation checklist wasn't completed after the mission, which required the bilges to be checked.

Leaders - don't let sound watch standing principles and emergency response training fall by the wayside, lest you lose an expensive piece of equipment or, worse, get someone hurt.

WoB - Sailing with children and dogs

Braving the elements, a group of 10 enthusiastic WoB'ers met at the RYCT to discuss the topic of sailing with children and/or dogs on board. Following is an overview of the main content of the meeting as well as a brief account of the July 13th and 14th Women on Boats Sailaway.

News

- Chris Barwick and Val Nicholls have submitted a WoB overview of the past decade to Julie McDonald for inclusion in the 50th Anniversary Edition in 2025.
- Chris Barwick has copies of the Cruising Helmsman available for loan. The group affirmed that this would be appreciated.
- The group affirmed interest in scoping the potential for a dinghy sailing experience.
- Chrissie Rowland has secured helicopter paramedic Adam Marmion for a presentation at our August WoB session.
- Enthusiasm for a September WoB book sharing session was expressed. Confirmation awaiting.
- WoB members are reminded and encouraged to consider participating in the running
 of the CYCT by nominating for a position on the committee at the next AGM.

Sailing with Children and Dogs

The topic provoked some interesting and far-reaching discussion. Points of interest included:

- An observation that often parent/s may be more anxious about the child on the boat than the child is. De-escalation of parental anxiety may be required e.g. explaining the role of the keel and how it can be flattened out at any time etc
- Many commented that children react well to the sailing adventure and relish being given responsibility for helming, rowing, monitoring depth etc
- When swimming on anchor it was recommended that the dinghy be tied by the painter
 and floating in the water as a safety measure. A rope, or specific ladder over the side
 was also recommended.
- Similarly, the creation of a 'safety mermaid' was recommended i.e. a 20m rope with flotation buoys provides an excellent safety line for young swimmers.
- Adventure activities such as racing dinghies or RIBs, hanging on the boom etc. prove very appealing to some!
- Interesting discussion was had considering the somewhat risk-averse nature of
 contemporary child rearing and how sailing offered opportunity for young people to
 learn about real and perceived risk, to feel and overcome the twinges of hesitancy and
 fear that can lead to a sense of competency and accomplishment.

Dogs

Many and amusing tales of dogs on the water!

- Some wore life jackets others didn't unless in the dinghy in rough weather.
- The pee mat and early training was regarded as essential but no guarantee.

 It was pointed out that whilst dogs can "swim" with their dog paddle, they cannot float and without a life jacket may become exhausted.

- Dogs that bark on board may be remedied with the use of barking collars that emit citronella as a deterrent.
- LIST map identifies what title is on a particular block of land and may be useful in working out if it is OK to walk the dog there.

This very convivial and informative evening was "polished off" with a delightful meal at Chillies, Sandy Bay.

Sailaway: 13th and 14th July

Originally 6 WoB skippers nominated themselves and their vessel to host two or three WoB crew for a weekend of sailing, nautical learning, as well as the development of skills, confidence and competence. However, for four of the skippers unexpected events prevented them from participating. Nonetheless Tracey Taylor Stella and Val Nicholls Aziza along with two crew per boat headed out from Kettering around 10am on Saturday morning in a barely a breath of wind to return on Sunday around 10 am in a 20kt southerly.

The activities of the day were adapted to meet the needs and interests of the crew: Engine checks and troubleshooting, helming, sails up and down, anchoring, picking up moorings, discussion of sail plans etc. The boats opted to anchor out of the southerly forecast for early Sunday morning and chose to moor in Apollo Bay. Aziza crew joined Stella for a delicious, shared meal and broad reaching conversation. Both boats organized for an 8.30 am getaway on Sunday to miss the worst of the coming gale. A 20 kt following wind made for a speedy return to Kettering to drop off crew and for Stella to

make the extra dash to Barnes Bay and home.

There is no doubt that even with just two boats and six people, the sailaway was utterly worthwhile as a unique experiential learning opportunity. WoB will plan another before the end of the year.

Women on Boats is open to all female members of the CYCT regardless of boat ownership or experience levels.

How long is a snubber? - Andrew Boon

Having prepared my PowerPoint presentation addressing this question and with the opening slide on the screen at the winter forum, it occurred to me that not everyone might know what a *snubber* is. A quick show of hands confirmed my fear: half of the room was ignorant about this

essential item of anchoring kit.

The snubber has been around for many decades. In the past (and the present for many vessels) the snubber was a short strop of nylon rope with a metal chain claw, hook or shackle on one end to attach to the anchor chain. and a spliced eye on the inboard end dropped over a cleat or samson post. The snubber took the load of the anchor chain off the winch/windlass. but more importantly it stopped the clonking noise that a firm chain made as it rolled from side to side on the bow roller. This noise annoys those sleeping in the forward cabin. But it can do so much more

After a quick show-and-tell with Juliet's current snubber, 7.6 m of 14 mm 3-strand nylon rope with a shackle on one end and an eye-splice on the other, we returned to the PowerPoint slides. I described each component in my anchoring system and listed the specifications of each: anchor, chain, snubber and cleats.

When preparing the talk, I realised that the working load of the snubber is significantly less than the chain and certainly less than the holding power of my anchor in some bottom types. I will be making a new snubber of 16 mm nylon rope in the near future.

The results of an experiment where I measured the elongation of my snubber while recording the tension showed the difference between an ideal elastic snubber and a length of nylon rope. The elongation of an ideal snubber is directly proportional to the tension and the elongation returns to zero when the tension is removed. The graph of elongation vs tension is in the PowerPoint slide; suffice it to say that is far from ideal!

I then introduced an App that models the forces on anchors, rodes and vessels in various combinations of wind speed, water depth and sea states.

We discussed some conclusions which are drawn from a mathematical model of an anchoring situation. Using a fixed scope rule (always 5:1 scope, etc) will often result in inadequate scope in



shallow water and more-than enough in deeper water. Other things being equal, you will experience smaller loads on your anchor chain when anchored in deeper water. The effect of using a good snubber was illustrated, with dramatic reductions in the peak loads.


So to the answer to the headline question:

the author of the app considers an 'excellent' snubber to be one which stretches 1.6 m in a wind of Force 8 on the Beaufort scale (34-40 knots).

The app can be used to estimate the wind force on your boat, hence anchor chain, in a Force 6 wind. Select the size (diameter) of rope for your snubber based on the required working load, consistent with the other anchoring components, e.g. 16 mm nylon rope has about the same breaking force as 10 mm galvanized chain. Then work out how long the snubber has to be to stretch 1.6 m with the wind load of the boat in Force 8. It will probably end up being a boat length or slightly longer.

The PowerPoint presentation is available on the club website. There was some interest in having a workshop in which snubbers are stretched and elongations measured. Hassle the committee if you are interested!



We will be waiting for a weather window for a Bluff departure in December. It will almost certainly mean Christmas, and possibly New Year, will be spent down south.

There are three of us already committed to this adventure and we could take one more crew. You must have offshore experience.

Background

The Auckland Islands are a group of New Zealand's subantarctic islands comprising three main islands, Auckland Island, Enderby Island and Adams Island, situated 270 miles south of New Zealand. To get there one sails through the roaring 40's and into the furious 50's.



The islands are National Nature Reserves. A National Nature Reserve is New Zealand's highest form of land protection. Contact with the shore requires a permit. Landings are only permitted at specific sites on Auckland Island and Enderby Island, with strict quarantine protocols.

The islands and surrounding ocean (out to the territorial sea boundary) are a collective World Heritage Area. Marine reserves surround the island

group. The coastal marine area of the Auckland Islands is also home to a marine mammal sanctuary.

Because of the islands' status and vulnerability, rigorous management procedures have been put in place. Each visit brings risks including introduction of invasive species (both terrestrial and marine) to any of the islands. **Further** includes fire, damage to fragile soils. and disturbance to wildlife.

Any of these could lead to irreversible changes in ecosystems and biodiversity. It is important that anyone coming will have read about the islands beforehand and understood the priorities that NZ Department of Conservation (DOC) have in protecting them.

Access is governed by DOC, which overseas biosecurity inspections, protocols and compliance, and issues permits to visit the islands. Departures can only be from Bluff, at the very south of South Island, New Zealand, where final inspections and briefings by DOC are carried out.

Mooring first approved in 2022 and available for a vessel up to 16 metres in length and up 20 tonnes. This mooring is located on the Eastern side of Northwest Bay (Howden), not far from the Wingara Road boat ramp.

CYCT Moorings

The CYCT owns two, recently serviced, moorings, available for the exclusive use of CYCT and CCCA members (see CCCA MOU). The use of a club mooring is always at your own judgment and risk.

The CYCT accepts no liability for damage caused to vessels using the mooring or any damage caused by any failure of the mooring. You must have adequate insurance for your boat and third party liability.

The following rules apply for the use of CYCT club moorings:

- The club burgee (CYCT or CCCA) must be displayed on your vessel whilst on a club mooring.
- There must be a current insurance policy in force for the vessel, including third party liability.
- Maximum stay on the mooring is 24 hours; in unusual circumstances, the Warden may approve an extended stay.
- If a boat without a CYCT or CCCA burgee has picked the mooring up, kindly ask them if they are a member. If they aren't, advise them that the mooring is private and request them to leave.
- Notwithstanding that the moorings are lifted and serviced annually, at all times the use of the moorings remains at member's own risk.
- Members are asked to email Mark Stephenson (warden@cyct.org.au) to register their use of the mooring as soon as practicable.

North Simmonds Bay, Bruny Island Number 1 - 8584.

Mooring number 8584 at North Simmonds Bay is a yellow buoy with a pillar for the pickup rope. The depth at LMWS is about 5 metres. It is located at 43° 07.446' S, 147° 21.396' E. The mooring consists of 3 wheels, then 6 m of 2 inch chain, then 6 m of 1-1/2 inch chain then 6 m of 5/8 inch chain.

Maximum length permitted by MAST is 12.2 m.




